# 20. APPLICATION FOR THE REVIEW OF A PREMISES LICENCE - READIPOP FESTIVAL, CHRISTCHURCH MEADOWS, CAVERSHAM, READING

The Head of Planning, Development and Regulatory Services submitted a report on an application by Reading Borough Council Environmental Protection and Nuisance Team for a review of the premises licence in respect of Readipop Festival, Christchurch Meadow, Caversham, Reading.

The report stated that the Reading Borough Council Environmental and Nuisance Team had submitted the review of the Premises Licence, outlining ten complaints that had been received from residents regarding noise from music being played at the event as well as noise from the fairground. The report also stated that a number of conditions contained on the premises licence were also breached and that there was a general lack of understanding of how to comply with these conditions.

The application sought for conditions on the premises licence to be amended and for new conditions to be applied and further, pursuant to section 177A Licensing Act 2003 the disapplication of conditions relating to noise attached to the premises licence.

A copy of the review application was attached to the report at Appendix RF-1.

The report stated that three representations had been received from local residents, which were attached to the report at Appendix RF-2a, RF-2b and RF-2c.

A plan showing the location of the premises and surrounding streets was attached to the report at Appendix RF-3.

Further to the report, the Event Application Form and a response to the review from the Premises Licence Holder had been circulated.

The report stated that the Premises Licence Holder was Readipop Limited and the Designated Premises Supervisor was Mr Mark Copley. The current Premises Licence, a copy of which was attached to the report at Appendix RF-4, permitted the following:

Hours for the Performance of Plays, Exhibition of Films, Indoor Sports, Performance of Live Music, Playing of Recorded Music, Performance of Dance, Sale of Alcohol and

Friday and Saturday	1100 hours until 2300 hours
Sunday	1100 hours until 2100 hours

Hours the Premises is Open to the Public

Friday and Saturday	1000 hours until 2330 hours
Sunday	1000 hours until 2130 hours

The premises licence was limited to one event per year which was to be notified to the Licensing Authority 28 days before the event started.

The premises still benefited from the exemption to play live music between 0800 hours and 2300 hours as per the provisions in the Live Music Act 2012 and the exemption for noise conditions stated at Section177A of the Licensing Act 2003.

The report stated that in determining the application the Licensing Authority had a duty to carry out its functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives, as follows:

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- public safety
- The prevention of public nuisance
- The protection of children from harm

The report stated further that in determining the application the Licensing Authority must also have regard to the representations received, the Licensing Authority's statement of licensing policy and any relevant section of the statutory guidance to licensing authorities. Further, in determining the application the Licensing Authority could take such of the following steps as it considered appropriate and proportionate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:

- Take no further action
- To issue formal warnings to the premises supervisor and/or premises licence holder
- Modify the conditions of the licence (including, but not limited to hours of operation of licensable activities)
- Exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence
- Remove the designated premises licence supervisor
- Suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months
- Revoke the licence

(Where the Sub-Committee took a step mentioned in the third and fourth bullet points above it may provide that the modification or exclusion was to have effect for a period not exceeding three months or permanently.)

The report set out paragraph 2.14 of the Secretary of State's Guidance, Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 (March 2015), which stated that the Act enabled licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It was therefore important that, in considering the promotion of the licensing objective of preventing public nuisance, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focused on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working in the area around the premises which might be disproportionate and unreasonable.

The report also set out paragraphs 1.5, 1.10, 11.18, 11.20, 15.36, 15.55, 15.56 of the Secretary of State's Guidance, Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 (March 2015) and paragraphs 10.5.1, 11.11.2 and 11.11.3 of the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy.

Mr Gavin Lombos, Readipop was present at the meeting and addressed the Sub-Committee and was represented by Mr William Donne, Licensing Consultant, who also addressed the Sub-Committee.

Rebecca Moon and Catherine Lewis, Reading Borough Council Environmental Protection and Nuisance Team, were present at the meeting and addressed the Sub-Committee on the application.

#### LICENSING APPLICATIONS SUB-COMMITTEE 2 MINUTES - 26 JANUARY 2017

Mr Alan Godfrey, Mrs Lin Godfrey and Mr James McMaster, local residents who had each submitted a valid representation, were present at the meeting and addressed the Sub-Committee.

#### Resolved -

That having reviewed the Premises Licence in respect of Readipop Festival, and having had regard to the licensing objectives and the oral and written representations made, the Secretary of State's guidance, in particular paragraphs 1.5, 2.14, 11.10, 11.18, 11.20, 15.36, 15.55 and 15.56, and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy, in particular paragraphs 10.5.1, 11.11.2 and 11.11.3, the Sub-Committee concluded that it would be appropriate and proportionate for the premises licence to remain in force but for new conditions to be added and for some current conditions to be amended.

That the following current conditions be amended and attached to the licence as follows:

- (a) Current condition 1 be amended to The control limits set at the mixer position shall be adequate to ensure that the music noise level shall not at any noise sensitive premises exceed 65 dBA over a 15 minute period throughout the duration of the licensable activities involving music. If there are more than 3 such licensable activities during the year, a lower limit of 62 dBA shall be in place;
- (b) Current condition 8 be amended to In advance of licensable activities involving music, such activities shall be notified to local residents via written notice which shall include a contact name and telephone number via which complaints about noise can be made on the day of the event. During operating hours, the licensee or nominated representative shall be available to receive and respond to nuisance related complaints. The contents of the notice and the area to be covered shall be agreed with the Reading Borough Council Environmental Protection and Nuisance Team prior to the notice being delivered to residents.

That the following new conditions be attached to the licence as follows:

- (c) Prior to each year's licensable activities involving music, the licensee shall carry out a noise nuisance risk assessment as part of the selection of acts and music genres. This risk assessment shall take into account the low frequency content of the music and other factors likely to cause annoyance, the timing, the duration and the programming of each act. The risk assessment shall be submitted to Reading Borough Council's Environmental Protection and Nuisance Team for approval at least four weeks prior to the start of the licensable activities involving music, which shall not take place without the approval being in place;
- (d) No activity involving funfair rides shall be permitted within the western side of the Christchurch meadows area;
- (e) The funfair shall only operate during the permitted hours of the licence;

(f) The festival shall employ a noise management consultant suitably qualified to a standard recognised by the Institute of Acoustics to monitor and report on noise levels and liaise with Reading Borough Council as required in the preparation and during the performance of the licensable activities involving music;

That Section 177A of the Licensing Act 2003 did not apply to conditions 1 to 10 on the current premises licence or to the amended and newly imposed conditions;

The Sub-Committee's reasons were due to the number of complaints received from residents regarding noise nuisance during 2016 and the assurances from the Premises Licence Holder that there would be no more drum and bass music and that the funfair would not take place except within the licensed area and would be limited to children's' rides.

# LICENSING ACT 2003 HEARING TUESDAY 28TH FEBRUARY 2017 @ 1700HRS

#### APPLICATION FOR THE GRANT OF A PREMISES LICENCE

1. Premises:

Purple Turtle 9 Gun Street Reading RG1 2JR

#### 2. Applicant:

Purple Turtle (Holdings) Ltd

3. Premises Licence:

There is a premises licence already in force at 9 Gun Street. This application is for a grant of a new licence. The applicant has indicated that if this application is granted then they would surrender the licence that is currently in force at the premises.

4. Proposed licensable activities and hours:

The application is for the grant of a premises licence for the following times:

Tuesday and Wednesday (1100hrs until 0300hrs) Monday/Thursday/Friday/Saturday (1100hrs until 0330hrs) Sunday (1200hrs until 0300hrs)

For the following activities:

Plays/Films/Indoor Sports/Live Music/Recorded Music/Performance of Dance/Anything Similar to Live Music, Recorded Music and Performance of Dance/Sale of alcohol/Late Night Refreshment (from 2300hrs each day)

Proposed Opening Hours:

Sunday/Tuesday/Wednesday until 0330hrs Monday/Thursday/Friday/Saturday until 0400hrs

#### 5. Temporary Event Notices

In considering any application the Licensing Authority should be aware of the possible use of Temporary Event Notices to extend entertainment activities or hours of operation. A premises may extend the hours or scope of their operation by the use of Temporary Event Notices. Up to 15 events per year can be held under this provision at a particular premises. These events may last for up to 168 hours provided less than 500 people are accommodated and provided the total number of days used for these events does not exceed 21 per year.

# 7. Date of closure of period for representations:

### 9. <u>Licensing Objectives and Reading Borough Council's Licensing Policy</u> <u>Statement</u>

In considering representations received the Licensing Authority has a duty to carry out it's functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives, which are as follows:

- the prevention of crime and disorder;
- public safety
- the prevention of public nuisance
- the protection of children from harm

Any conditions that are placed on a premises licence should be appropriate and proportionate with a view to promoting the licensing objectives. The Licensing Authority can amend, alter or refuse an application should it be deemed appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

The Council's licensing policy also places an onus on applicant's who wish to open past 11pm to demonstrate how they will mitigate the issues of crime and disorder and potential public nuisance.

#### Amended Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 March 2015

# Licensing Objectives and Aims:

1.5 (However) the legislation also supports a number of other key aims and purposes. These are vitally important and should be principal aims for everyone involved in licensing work.

They include protecting the public and local residents from crime, anti-social behaviour and noise nuisance caused by irresponsible licensed premises;

#### Public nuisance:

2.14 The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.

## Steps to promote the licensing objectives:

- 8.33 In completing an operating schedule, applicants are expected to have regard to the statement of licensing policy for their area. They must also be aware of the expectations of the licensing authority and the responsible authorities as to the steps that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, and to demonstrate knowledge of their local area when describing the steps they propose to take to promote the licensing objectives. Licensing authorities and responsible authorities are expected to publish information about what is meant by the promotion of the licensing objectives advice about these matters. However, applicants are also expected to undertake their own enquiries about the area in which the premises are situated to inform the content of the application.
- 8.34 Applicants are, in particular, expected to obtain sufficient information to enable them to demonstrate, when setting out the steps they propose to take to promote the licensing objectives, that they understand:
- the layout of the local area and physical environment including crime and disorder hotspots, proximity to residential premises and proximity to areas where children may congregate;
- any risk posed to the local area by the applicants' proposed licensable activities; and
- any local initiatives (for example, local crime reduction initiatives or voluntary schemes including local taxi-marshalling schemes, street pastors and other schemes) which may help to mitigate potential risks.
- 8.35 Applicants are expected to include positive proposals in their application on how they will manage any potential risks. Where specific policies apply in the area (for example, a cumulative impact policy), applicants are also expected to demonstrate an understanding of how the policy impacts on their application;

any measures they will take to mitigate the impact; and why they consider the application should be an exception to the policy.

- 8.36 It is expected that enquiries about the locality will assist applicants when determining the steps that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. For example, premises with close proximity to residential premises should consider what effect this will have on their smoking, noise management and dispersal policies to ensure the promotion of the public nuisance objective. Applicants must consider all factors which may be relevant to the promotion of the licensing objectives, and where there are no known concerns, acknowledge this in their application.
- 8.37 The majority of information which applicants will require should be available in the licensing policy statement in the area. Other publicly available sources which may be of use to applicants include:
- the Crime Mapping website;
- Neighbourhood Statistics websites;
- websites or publications by local responsible authorities;
- websites or publications by local voluntary schemes and initiatives; and
- on-line mapping tools.
- 8.38 While applicants are not required to seek the views of responsible authorities before formally submitting their application, they may find them to be a useful source of expert advice on local issues that should be taken into consideration when making an application. Licensing authorities may wish to encourage co-operation between applicants, responsible authorities and, where relevant, local residents and businesses before applications are submitted in order to minimise the scope for disputes to arise.
- 8.39 Applicants are expected to provide licensing authorities with sufficient information in this section to determine the extent to which their proposed steps are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives in the local area. Applications must not be based on providing a set of standard conditions to promote the licensing objectives and applicants are expected to make it clear why the steps they are proposing are appropriate for the premises.

#### Representations from the police:

9.12 In their role as a responsible authority, the police are an essential source of advice and information on the impact and potential impact of licensable activities, particularly on the crime and disorder objective. The police have a key role in managing the night-time economy and should have good working relationships with those operating in their local areas. The police should be the licensing authority's main source of advice on matters relating to the promotion of the crime and disorder licensing objective, but may also be able to make relevant representations with regard to the other licensing objectives if they have evidence to support such representations. The licensing authority should accept all reasonable and proportionate representations made by the police unless the authority has evidence that to do so would not be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. However, it remains incumbent on the police to ensure that their representations can withstand the scrutiny to which they would be subject at a hearing.

#### Effect of special policies:

- 13.30 The effect of adopting a special policy of this kind is to create a rebuttable presumption that applications for the grant or variation of premises licences or club premises certificates which are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused or subject to certain limitations, following relevant representations, unless the applicant can demonstrate in the operating schedule that there will be no negative cumulative impact on one or more of the licensing objectives. Applicants should give consideration to potential cumulative impact issues when setting out the steps they will take to promote the licensing objectives in their application.
- 13.36 A special policy should never be absolute. Statements of licensing policy should always allow for the circumstances of each application to be considered properly and for applications that are unlikely to add to the cumulative impact on the licensing objectives to be granted. After receiving relevant representations in relation to a new application for or a variation of a licence or certificate, the licensing authority must consider whether it would be justified in departing from its special policy in the light of the individual circumstances of the case. The impact can be expected to be different for premises with different styles and characteristics. For example, while a large nightclub or high capacity public house might add to problems of cumulative impact, a small restaurant or a theatre may not. If the licensing authority decides that an application should be refused, it will still need to show that the grant of the application would undermine the promotion of one of the licensing objectives and that appropriate conditions would be ineffective in preventing the problems involved.

13.39 Every application should still be considered individually. Therefore, special policies must not restrict such consideration by imposing quotas - based on either the number of premises or the capacity of those premises. Quotas that indirectly have the effect of predetermining the outcome of any application should not be used because they have no regard to the individual characteristics of the premises concerned.

#### Licensing Act 2003

The Licensing Act 2003 under Section 18 (6) also states that any relevant representation should be considered in the context of:

(a) the <u>likely effect</u> of the <u>grant</u> of the premises licence on the promotion of the licensing objectives.

Therefore in the context of the grant of a licence, it is reasonable for the Licensing Authority to base it's decision on an application on what the <u>likely</u> <u>effects</u> of granting a licence would have on the promotion of the licensing objectives.

#### The Council's Licensing Policy Statement:

Cumulative Impact Policy

<u>8.1.9</u> The effect of keeping the cumulative impact policy, is to create a rebuttable presumption that applications for new premises licences and club premises certificates or material variations, will be refused, if relevant representations are received. A rebuttable presumption is not a presumption that is absolute; it is a presumption that may be overturned if sufficient evidence can be provided against the presumption.

<u>8.1.11</u> Where during the application for the grant or variation of a premises licence or club premises certificate, responsible authorities or interested parties are concerned that the licensing objectives will be impacted upon, there are likely to *be* relevant representations, which would lead to the application proceeding to a hearing. If at that hearing, an applicant is able to rebut the presumption of refusal by demonstrating there will be no negative impact on the licensing objectives, a licence can still be granted. However, if the presumption cannot be rebutted, the application is likely to be refused.

<u>8.6.8 Bars/Clubs/music and dancing venues:</u> - Subject to the rebuttable presumption as outlined at paragraph 8.1.9 above, the policy is to refuse applications for such premises. Experience has shown that venues which serve alcohol, often at low prices; provide limited seating for customers; provide facilities for music and dancing; and which are alcohol rather than food-led, have the strongest potential to have a negative impact on the

licensing objectives and to add to cumulative impact. Applicants seeking to operate in the CIP area will need to demonstrate that detailed measures proposed in the operating schedule will result in no increase in crime and disorder.

## 11.4 Licensed Premises in Residential Areas

11.4.1 In general the Authority will deal with the issue of licensing hours on the individual merits of each application. However, when issuing a licence, stricter conditions are likely to be imposed with regard to noise control in the case of premises that are situated in largely residential areas. In general, public houses located in and catering for residential areas wishing to open beyond 11pm will need to demonstrate clearly that public nuisance will not result from later operation.



#### WITH THIS APPLICATION

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#### 1. CCTV

- 1.1 A CCTV system shall be installed, in accordance with current or amended Home Office Guidelines relating to UK Police Requirements for Digital CCTV Systems. The system shall be maintained and operated correctly to the satisfaction of Thames Valley Police, (TVP) ensuring all licensed areas of the premises (except toilet facilities) are monitored, including all entry and exit points enabling frontal identification of every person entering and in any light condition.
- 1.2 All cameras shall continually record whilst the premises are open to the public and the recordings shall be kept and available for a minimum of 31 days with time and date stamping and except for mechanical breakdown beyond the control of the proprietor shall be made available upon request (or, at the latest, within 12 hours of the request) to the authorised officers of TVP or of Reading Borough Council ("RBC"). Any breakdown or system failure will be notified to the police and remedied as soon as practicable. Any request from TVP or RBC for a recording to be made for evidential purposes must be carried out as soon as reasonably practicable and in any event, within 12 hours of the request being made.
- 1.3 Recordings shall be made available to an authorised officer of TVP or an authorised officer of RBC together with facilities for viewing by a person qualified to operate the system.
- 1.4 A sign advising customers that CCTV is in use shall be positioned in a prominent position. A fully trained person who can operate the system shall be available at all times when the premises is open to the public.

#### 2. Door Supervisors

- 2.1 A register of Door Supervisors shall be kept. The register must show the following details:
  - Full SIA registration number.
  - Date and time that the Door Supervisor commenced duty, countersigned by the Designated Premises Supervisor or Duty Manager.
  - Date and time that the Door Supervisor finished work, countersigned by the Designated Premises Supervisor or Duty Manager.
  - Any occurrence or incident of interest involving crime & disorder or public safety must be recorded giving names of the Door Supervisor involved.
  - A record of the number of patrons on site shal be made half hourly in the door register.
- 2.2 The Door Supervisor register shall be kept at the premises and be available for inspection by an authorised officer of TVP, or an authorised officer from RBC and shall be retained for a period of 1 year.
- 2.3 Door Supervisors shall be clearly identifiable at all times whilst on duty and display Hi-Visibility personalised armbands containing their SIA badge.

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### 3. Search Policy

- 3.1 The Premises Licence Holder must implement a search policy w including search, detection, confiscation, storage and disposal of drugs procedures. A copy of the written policy shall be provided to TVP for its comment on an annual basis.
- 3.2 Notices shall be displayed advising the public that the right to conduct an outer body search is reserved as a condition of entry, and that the TVP shall be informed if anyone is found in possession of illegal drugs or offensive weapons.
- 3.3 The venue shall also actively partake in drugs initiatives run by TVP (including, but not exclusively, drug itemiser, passive drug dogs and spiked drinks campaigns).

### 4. Dispersal Policy

A closure and dispersal policy, for controlling the closing of the premises and the departure of customers at the conclusion of the licensed activities shall shall be actively operated. Whilst dealing with the dispersal of patrons the door staff shall wear full high visibility vests.

#### 5. Townsafe Radio

The Premises Licence Holder shall participate, as far as is practicable, in the Local Town Radio Scheme when the premises are opened for licensable activities after 2100hrs Monday to Sunday inclusive.

### 6. Staff Training

The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that all staff employed in the sale of alcohol shall be trained in their responsibilities and a record of their training shall be maintained. These records shall be made available to any authorised Officer of TVP or an authorised Officer of RBC. Refresher training shall formally take place once every 6 months and signed records of this training shall be maintained. These records shall be kept for a minimum of 1 year and shall be made available to any authorised Officer of TVP or an authorised Officer of TVP or an authorised Officer of RBC.

### 7. Incident Book

- 7.1 An incident book shall be used to record details of incidents that occur in and around the venue. The incident book shall truly reflect what has occurred and shall be specific in detail. If incidents involve members of staff, including door supervisors their names shall be entered onto the log book. All incidents shall be signed off either by the Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) or the nominated individual when the DPS is not on site.
- 7.2 All visits by an enforcement authority and all refusals of service, shall be recorded. The incident book shall be retained for a period of six months and shall be made available on request to any authorised Officers of TVP or authorised Officers of RBC.

### 8. Drinks

- 8.1 The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that a system of preventing drinks being taken from the building by customers other than to the beer garden or other enclosed area is adopted and maintained. The Premises Licence holder shall prevent customers from leaving the premise with any alcoholic or non-alcoholic drinks from the Premises in open containers (e.g. glasses, opened bottles & cans).
- 8.2 The Premises Licence holder shall ensure notices are predominantly displayed at all exit points to advise customers that the area surrounding the premises is an Alcohol Restriction Zone.
- 8.3 Unless condition 8.4 applies, the premises shall at all times operate a "Challenge 25" policy to challenge any customers attempting to purchase alcohol, who appear to a staff member to be under the age of 25 years. Alcohol shall not be sold to a customer so challenged without having first provided identification to demonstrate that he/she is over the age of 18.
- 8.4 No breach of condition 8.3 shall occur and/or no breach of any "Challenge 25" (or similar) policy shall be deemed to have occurred, where a customer's ID (as detailed in 8.5) has been scanned on entry to the Premises, to demonstrate that the customer is over the age of 18.
- 8.5 Only a valid British driver's licence showing a photograph of the person, a valid passport, proof of age card showing the "PASS" hologram or Military Identidy Cards are to be accepted as identification.
- 8.6 Notices advertising the Challenge 25 and proof of age policies shall be displayed in prominent positions on the premises.

#### 9. General operation of the Premises

- 9.1 There shall be no entry to the premises by new customers after 02.00 on Saturday and Sunday mornings.
- 9.2 The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that no noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which in either case gives rise to undue disturbance to local residents.
- 9.3 All external doors and windows must be kept closed, other than for access and egress, when events involving amplified music or speech are taking place.
- 9.4 Periodic observation of the noise level and the likelihood that it will cause undue disturbance, shall be undertaken by a member of staff at the boundary at reasonable and regular intervals and logged. This log must be made available for inspection by an Authorised Officer. The logbook must set out: time and date of observation; observer; observation of noise level i.e. either A: satisfactory level of noise unlikely to cause disturbance, or B: unsatisfactory level of noise, likely to cause undue disturbance; and if the level of noise is unsatisfactory, the action taken to resolve situation.
- 9.5 During operating hours, the licensee or a nominated representative shall be available to receive and respond to nuisance-related complaints. A contact number shall be readily available to residents upon request.

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9.6 The placing of refuse – such as bottles – into receptacles outside the premises shall only take place between the hours of 08.00hrs and 21.00hrs.

However, the proposal for the connection of the basements between numbers 9 and 10 has raised some concerns for us as there will be a substantial increase in the capacity. The premises the increased capacity for the combined basements at number 9 and number 10 will be and extra 240 persons (37%) however, the applicant has suggested that for first six months they would limit the combined capacity to 390 (29%), this is in conflict with the Council's CIP policy.

TVP along with RBC held a meeting with the owners of the venue where the violent crime and disorder issues related to the current premises between 1<sup>st</sup> January 2014 and 31<sup>st</sup> October 2016 were discussed and the levels of incidents were outlined to them.

We found the meeting with your clients last month to be very beneficial and constructive. At the conclusion of the meeting a number of proposals was tabled and it is was agreed that there would be a three month trial period, beginning after the festive season, to gauge if there was going to be a successful improvement in the number of occurrences being experienced at the venue. The last entry proposal, it was announced would start immediately

Despite this agreement a new application was submitted on 22<sup>nd</sup> December 2016. TVP emailed the owners expressing our concerns, predominantly about for the connection of the basements between numbers 9 and 10, as there had been insufficient time for both the Council and TVP to gauge the agreed measures which had not been properly tested and it was suggested that the application be withdrawn and submitted later in the year.

This was disappointing rejected by the applicants who also advised that the extension into number 10 would not lead to an increase in cumulative impact. Despite this from 1<sup>st</sup> November 2016 to date TVP have received reports of fourteen incidents at the premises, nine of them being assaults, these are the incidents that have been reported as there is evidence of an unreported incident.

Due to the anticipated and ongoing violent crime and disorder TVP are objecting to the application for number 9 Gun Street, Reading.

### Purple Turtle , 9 Gun Street Proposed minor variation to the basement of number 9 to include the basement of number 10.

Thank you very much for copying me into your response to my email of 10 June regarding the above proposed application. Over the summer there have been some developments on the planning side, so I thought I would update you concerning those but also as regards the minor variation application possibility.

### **Additional information**

I suspect that my original email did not provide you with sufficient information to enable you to be satisfied that the proposed minor variation to include a limited area (i.e. the basement under number 10 Gun Street) within number 9's Premises Licence, would not (in all likelihood) have any adverse effect on the promotion of the Licensing Objectives. I apologise for this and my clients have provided some additional information for your consideration – set out below.

Before you consider the specifics of the proposed application, I think that we agree that the Minor Variation application procedure can (and in our experience, often is used to) allow the inclusion of an additional area, within the scope of an existing licence. Indeed, it may be of interest to you to know that some clients of ours recently obtained a minor variation to their Premises Licence permitting their guest capacity to be increased to over 10,000 per day (over the course of a week), for an annual tournament. It cannot be the case that increased capacity alone necessarily rules out the use of the minor variation process as otherwise this would conflict with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. Whilst I note your comments relating to the Guidance – it is clear that changes to the layout which will not, in all likelihood (taking into account available evidence), have an adverse impact on the licensing objectives, should fall squarely within the section 41A procedure.

The current situation is that the basement at 9 Gun Street can hold 200 patrons. The capacity of the basement at number 10 is expected to be 240. The total capacity of the combined space is therefore expected to be 440. However to ensure that patrons have **more space** per capita than is currently the situation in number 9, our clients would be quite content to limit the maximum capacity (when the two basements are being used in unison) to 390 (certainly for the first 6 months of trading) – so that the effect of the larger combined space (in terms of the promotion of the Licensing Objectives) can be assessed.

Our clients are confident that the more pleasant combined basement – giving patrons more room in which to mingle – will aid and not hinder the promotion of the Licensing Objectives but if once the combined basement operation has 'bedded down', some minor 'tweaks' are desirable to their current, robust, management/staffing procedures – these can be assessed and implemented, as needs be.

#### Increased promotion of Licensing Objectives

Accordingly although the combined basement capacity would be 390 (with patrons having more space per capita) - this would in turn lead (in all likelihood) to:

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- 1. **Improved queue management** in Gun Street with patrons being able to access the combined basement quicker minimising the risk of disruption in the street;
- Better sound containment. Although you mention that there would be a "potential increase in noise" this
  does not follow from the proposed changes. The aim is that most of the live music currently played on the
  ground floor of number 9 would go into the combined basement which would be well-sound proofed –
  clearly minimising the risk of those outside the premises being disturbed by music within it.
- 3. Other improvements which would be related to the combined use of number 9 and 10 including:
  - a. Better external lighting in Gun Street;
  - b. Additional CCTV (inside and outside);
  - c. Increased security provision.

#### Consistency with planning permission

Our suggestion that the basement of number 10 is included in the licence for number 9 (through a minor variation application) is also entirely consistent with the planning permission that has been granted for the development. I attach a copy of this and draw your attention in particular to conditions 17 to 19. The hours relating to the basement use are, as you will see, until 04:00 each day to match with the use of number 9. Whilst we appreciate that the planning regime is quite separate to the licensing regime, it is of course of significance that the planning authorities had no concerns about the expanded basement operating until 04:00, as part and parcel of number 9.

#### Suggestion to move matters forward

To move matters forward and to hopefully allay any concerns, my clients wonder whether it might be helpful to take you through the suggested changes (vis a vis the combined basement) on site and to this end, perhaps you would let me know if you are happy to meet with them at the Purple Turtle? If so perhaps you could let me have a direct number for you so my clients (Danny Fraifeld and Greg Muden) can contact you directly?

#### Content of Application:

The application is for the grant of a premises licence at 9 Gun Street, Reading for the above licensable activities and times concluding at the above mentioned times.

Opening Hours are:

Monday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday from 1100hrs to 0400hrs, Tuesday and Wednesday from 1100hrs to 0330hrs and Sunday 1200hrs to 0330hours

### Licensing Officer's Comments:

In order to promote the four licensing objectives as per Reading Borough Council's Licensing Policy Statement- notably Section 8 from pages 15-20 relating to the Cumulative Impact Area, I object to this application to operate the premises known as the Purple Turtle, 9 Gun Street, Reading and would ask the Licensing Committee to refuse this application.

Reading Borough Council's Licensing Policy statement clearly states that its Vision is "To promote Reading as a safe and healthy environment in which responsible operators provide lawful and responsible facilities for the enjoyment of the Town's residents and visitors". The statement of Licensing Policy is underpinned by four core objectives:

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- Public safety
- The prevention of public nuisance
- The protection of children from harm

As you will be aware, the Purple Turtle is an existing licensed premises, that operating before the Cumulative Impact Area was introduced in Reading, however the applicant has chosen to apply for the grant of a premises licence rather than a variation of the existing premises licence. Their application outlines that they wish to extend their licensable area to include the basement area under number 10 Gun Street, a property they also occupy, which will likely result in an increase of capacity, however this has not be made clear in their application. References to increasing capacities can be found at Section 8.5.1 and imposing safe capacities at Section 13.1.4 of the Council's Licensing Policy statement.

As you will be aware, the premises is located in Gun Street which is part of the Council's Cumulative Impact Area. The applicant has failed to rebut the Council's Cumulative Impact policy. For the Council to grant a licence in the Cumulative Impact Area it must be satisfied that the presumption of refusal has been rebutted and that the granting of the licence would not add to the Cumulative Impact within the area. It is incumbent on the applicant to demonstrate this as outlined in the Council's Licensing Policy Statement. Although the applicant has offered conditions in the operating schedule, no detailed policies such as a dispersal policy, search policy or drugs policy have been submitted nor additional information such as numbers of door staff they plan to operate with a larger venue as would be expected for a grant application for a premises within a Cumulative Impact Area.

The premises is located on a short section of Gun Street about 85m (280 feet) long shared by several other licensed premises. Gun Street is specifically mentioned in as a problem area in Reading Borough Councils Licensing Policy statement.

Section 8.1.4 states concerns do exist about the number of licensed premises in parts of the town centre, particularly in Friar Street, and <u>Gun Street</u> areas, together with the impact that these premises have upon the licensing objectives. The Council recognises the concerns of residents in areas with high proportions of licensed premises and will use best endeavours and all available legislation so as to ensure these premises and the activities associated with them are properly controlled and do not result in unreasonable disturbance for residents.

The approach of the Licensing Team:

The Responsible Authorities named in the Licensing Act 2003 have to ensure that the licensing objectives are all actively <u>promoted</u> to <u>prevent</u> crime and disorder and public nuisance. However, all four licensing objectives are of equal importance.

Section 1.5 of the Secretary of State's Guidance states that the Licensing Act 2003 also supports a number of <u>other</u> key aims and purposes. These are vitally important and should be the principal aims of everyone involved in licensing work: They Include

protecting the public and local residents from crime, anti-social behaviour and noise nuisance.

Section 18 (6) of the Licensing Act 2003 states that representations should be about the <u>likely effect</u> of the grant of a licence on the <u>promotion</u> of the licensing objectives. Therefore as outlined in the Court of Appeal Licensing case Hope and Glory v City of Westminster (2011) EWCA Civ31 - *licensing decisions ....involve an evaluation of what is to be regarded as reasonably acceptable in a particular location...(this) is essentially a matter of judgement rather than a matter of pure fact'*.

The Secretary of State's Guidance at paragraphs 8.33 to 8.39 specifically outline what an applicant should do in order to be able to demonstrate that the proposed use of the premises for licensable activities would not undermine the licensing objectives. Section 8.33 states that applicants are expected to have regard to the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy.

Section 8.34 outlines that applicants are expected to demonstrate that they understand the layout of the local area and proximity to residential premises so as to fully and effectively gauge the risk posed to the local area.

Section 8.36 states that premises with close proximity to residential premises should consider what effect this will have on their smoking, noise management and dispersal policies to ensure the promotion of the public nuisance objective.

Section 8.39 outlines that applicants are expected to make it clear <u>why</u> the steps being proposed in the operating schedule are appropriate for the premises. There does not seem to be any explanation within the operating schedule as to why the included steps are appropriate for the premises.

#### Cumulative Impact: The approach of Reading Borough Council

The Cumulative Impact Policy and designated area were introduced due to a high concentration of licensed premises within the town centre and the impact these premises were having on the promotion of the Licensing objectives. The policy. detailed within Section 8 of the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy, details the rationale of this approach. It also creates a rebuttable assumption that applications for the grant or variation of a premises licence or club premises certificate within the Cumulative Impact Area will be refused or limited - if relevant representations are received - unless the applicant is able to demonstrate within their operating schedule that there will be no negative cumulative impact on one or more of the licensing objectives. This is detailed within Sections 8.1.9 to 8.1.11 and is entirely consistent with Section 13.30 of the Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003. Section 8.5.1 of the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy states that it will apply to all applications for premises licences and club premises certificates as well as material variations within the Reading Central CIP Area. Material variations include increases in hours, increases in capacity (licensable area) and any other variation that are likely to add to the overall cumulative impact in the area.

One further point to make on Cumulative Impact is with reference to the stated case of R (on the application of Portsmouth City Council) v 3D Entertainment Group (CRC) Ltd [2011] EWHC 507 (Admin). The Learned Judge Supperstone within paragraph 11 of the judgement stated that Magistrates had erred in law by incorrectly applying Portsmouth's Cumulative Impact Policy in a way that required the Council and Police to abduce evidence that there would be a negative cumulative impact. He went on to state in paragraph 18 of the judgement that the burden was <u>entirely</u> on 3D Entertainment Group to persuade the Licensing Authority that the operating schedule was such that there would be no cumulative impact. In short therefore, the onus is on the applicant to <u>rebut</u> the Council's Cumulative Impact Policy if applying for a grant or variation within the cumulative impact area and this should primarily be done through the operating schedule of the submitted application form.

Section 8.1.9 of the Council's Licensing Policy statement states the effect of keeping the cumulative impact policy, is to create a rebuttable presumption that applications for new premises licences and club premises certificates or material variations, will be refused, if relevant representations are received. A rebuttable presumption is not a presumption that is absolute; it is a presumption that may be overturned if sufficient evidence can be provided against the presumption. Appendix C to this reports list a number of policies and conditions that could be included in an operating schedule and considered by the council.

Additionally Section 8.6.8 of the Council's Licensing Policy statement states under Bars/Clubs/music and dancing venues: - Subject to the rebuttable presumption as outlined at paragraph 8.1.9 above, the policy is to refuse applications for such premises. Experience has shown that venues which serve alcohol, often at low prices; provide limited seating for customers; provide facilities for music and dancing; and which are alcohol rather than food-led, have the strongest potential to have a negative impact on the licensing objectives and to add to cumulative impact. Applicants seeking to operate in the CIP area will need to demonstrate that detailed measures proposed in the operating schedule will result in no increase in crime and disorder.

The attached appendices IX and X to this representation clearly indicates the levels of crime and disorder in Gun Street and the rest of the Cumulative Impact Area between 0200hrs and 0559hrs and are of great concern which could have a significant impact on crime and disorder and therefore police resources. As stated previously, the applicant has not demonstrated within their application how they will operate and disperse in potential increase of customers attending the premises - particularly at closing time. As a result this may lead to an increase in crime and disorder as intoxicated customers congregate in Gun Street and surrounding area.

I would also like to draw to the attention of the Licensing Committee to Section 9.12 of the Licensing Act guidance. This states that the police should be the Licensing authority's main source of advice on matters relating to the promotion of the crime and disorder licensing objective. Given that Thames Valley Police are supportive of the Council's Cumulative Impact Policy, police this area for the safety and protection of the residents of Reading and are also objecting to this application should indicate the seriousness of potentially granting a licence which will likely result in increased capacity in an area already under stress.

Section 13.1.4 of Council's Licensing Policy statement states "Safe Capacities" should only be imposed where appropriate for the promotion of public safety or the prevention of crime and disorder. If a capacity has been imposed through other legislation, it would be inappropriate to reproduce it in a premises licence. However if no safe capacity has been imposed the authority may consider it appropriate for a new capacity to be attached when licensable activities are taking

place.

Therefore an increased number of customers could leave the premises at the same time and add to the significant issues in Gun Street as well to the Cumulative Impact within the town centre. The pressures this places on Responsible Authorities - notably Thames Valley Police - are huge and will place an additional burden on the policing and safety levels within the Cumulative Impact Area.

The applicant has failed to rebut this presumption meaning the licence applied for should be refused.





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## Measures that should normally be included in an operating schedules for applications to grant or vary in the CIP.

- the adoption of a "Challenge 25" policy with acceptable proof of id as per existing Statement of Licensing Policy.
- all off sales to be made in sealed containers for consumption away from the premises.
- a smoking policy which includes an assessment of noise and litter created by premises users.
- the use of plastic or polycarbonate drinking vessels and containers, especially in outside areas or after specified hours
- a policy in relation to searching customers and for drugs, weapons, seized or lost and found property
- use of a refusals book for registering attempts to buy alcohol by under-age persons or refusals to those intoxicated
- the installation of a digital CCTV system by liaison with, and to a standard approved by Thames valley Police.
- policies for dispersal of customers which may include signage regarding taxi services' telephone numbers and advice to respect neighbours and minimize noise
- systems to ensure any SIA doorstaff display appropriate badges when on duty and record all incidents of crime and disorder.

## Items to which positive consideration would be given

- membership of a Crime Reduction Partnership, Pubwatch, Neighbourhood Watch or similar schemes.
- use of 'townSafe' radio system or similar accredited scheme
- regular training and reminders for staff in respect of licensing legislation, policies and procedures; records of which should be properly recorded and available for inspection.
- records of regular checks of all parts of the premises in relation to drug use.
- systems in place to ensure details of barred clients are exchanged with other operators.
- giving an agreed minimum notice of special events (screening Of major sports events, birthday parties, adult entertainment, etc.) to relevant authorities and use of appropriate additional measures at such events, Matters that might be recommended for appropriate restrictions -
- entry to premises by under 18s after certain times
- consumption of food and drink in smoking areas
- access to outside seating areas after certain times Areas of best practice in licensing.

The items listed below are forms of best practice, some of which would be more appropriate to off sales rather than on sales



- Risk assessments


## Recommended best practice for both on and off premises

- Staff must be aware of the risk of the problem of proxy sales and offer assistance to responsible authorities to deter offences.
- Signage on premises should set out legal duties.
- Voluntary restriction of high strength alcohol operating schedules may be used to limit high ABV beers and ciders
- Staff training in addition to personal licence holders training, staff must be adequately trained for duties.
- Challenge 25 would be the norm, particularly in the off licence Trade.
- Signage proxy sale deterrence.

- Regular staff training against the four licensing objectives and including conditions on licence

I refer to the above application.

I have reviewed the application and consulted our records and would like to make representation against the application.

I am concerned that due to the residential location of the premises, the measures outlined in section P(d) of the application (listed under 'general operation of the premises') are not sufficient to prevent a public nuisance from occurring as a result of noise from recorded music, live music and films taking place in the outdoor area, until 3:30 am.

The premises has a number of residents living in the vicinity and complaints about noise from loud music have been made in the past (two complaints in 2008, one in 2009, one in 2011 and one in 2013). It is the view of the Environmental Protection team that it is not appropriate for these activities to take place outdoors where there are residential properties nearby, particularly into the early hours of the morning.

The main areas of concern are:

• Noise from films and music being broadcast outdoors

I do not believe that the measures proposed by the applicant would deal with this issue and the only effective way of preventing public nuisance from these activities would be to have no outdoor speakers.

If the applicant agreed to the following condition on the licence or the removal of outdoor music and film from the application then I will be willing to withdraw my representation.

No Use of External Speakers


No music or speech shall be relayed via external speakers.
