# What is the aim of your policy or new service?

# Who will benefit from this proposal and how?

All developers will benefit as the Preliminary Draft Charging Schedule (PDCS) for CIL will set out the proposed charges that developers will pay under CIL once introduced.

## What outcomes will the change achieve and for whom?

The PDCS is the first stage of consultation leading to the introduction of CIL at the local level. Introducing CIL will enable the Council to maximise developer contributions towards infrastructure, which in turn will enable sustainable development within the Borough. CIL provides for a fixed rate to be charged for development, which provides certainty to developers, and the residents of the Borough will benefit from the outputs of spend of CIL.

### Who are the main stakeholders and what do they want?

Other stakeholders want to ensure that the Council uses all measures available to secure infrastructure to support future development and the types of infrastructure which could be supported by CIL.
