

Case rate per 100,000 by age group - PHE LA Report -25.02.2021



Kent SARS-CoV-2 variant

All viruses mutate over time and new variants emerge regularly

This variant transmits more easily than other strains- 50-70% more

Evidence suggests this variant emerged in September 2020 and then circulated at very low levels in the population until mid-November

The increase in cases linked to the new variant first came to light in late November when PHE was investigating why infection rates in Kent were not falling despite national restrictions


Emerging data that the variant is more likely to cause severe disease or mortality, but we are continuing investigations to understand this better

The way to control this virus is the same, whatever the variant. It will not spread if we avoid close contact with others. Wash your hands, wear a mask, keep your distance from others, and reduce your social contacts

Public Health England said there was currently no evidence to suggest that vaccines will not be effective against the new strain

Lateral flow and PCR tests can detect this new variant

Comparison of SGTF cases and S-gene cases tested and classifiable in Taqpath labs - Reading only



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


Schools overview

Key issues

- All primaries for everyone from 8 March
- Secondaries from 8 March, with testing conducted in schools, 3 times and then home testing (not mandatory)
- Face coverings in secondary schools (not mandatory)

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Communications Update





Strategy and approach

- Amplify national messages by sharing NHS, PHE, Govt resources (e.g. the latest rules, vaccination programme)
- Respond to emerging issues e.g. free school meals, new testing centres
- Communicate messages of local significance



Insights

- Vaccine hesitancy (source: national data, local insight)
- Failure to isolate (source: Berkshire PH research + SAGE)
- Young people's concerns (source: workshop)
- I'm following the rules, others aren't (source: YouGov)
- Some groups or locations more at risk (source: local data)



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Recent Outbreaks



Case Study - Sports Team Outbreak

Notification received from within RBC on 11/12/20; Outbreak of 30 positive Covid cases within professional and academy sports team;

Academy plays regularly at secondary school – students included within team;

School closed due to separate outbreak;

Unknown whether formal link had been made between School and Club outbreaks;

Case Study Cont...

What did we do?

- Contact made immediately with the Clubs Covid officer;
- Club had contacted all players/parents and had isolated <u>all</u> players (cases and contacts) since 6/12;
- Club *proactively* closed all extended branches on 8/12 to prevent further cases.
- Remote inspection of Covid control measures carried out.
- Club deemed to be operating in line with current PHE Guidance.

No Further Action required on this occasion.

Case Study Cont...

Challenges

- Companies are not reporting cases and/or outbreaks to LA;
- Varying levels of information provided to EH Team regarding previous communication with businesses;
- Premises with outbreaks arising are not always previously known to us (no H&S interventions) therefore contacting some businesses has been challenging;
- Health and Safety Enforcement role shared between multiple agencies;
- PHE have been successful in contacting Company Head Offices however this may have not been communicated to local branches whom we would initially speak with
- Verifying and securing information from anonymous complainants




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

Local Roll-out

- GP offer to care home residents and staff
- Delivery via Primary care networks;
 - -Tilehurst Village Surgery Watlington House
 - -Circuit Lane Surgery Emmer Green -University Health Centre
- Hospital Hubs for Health and Social care staff Wokingham and Royal Berks Hospital sites- Dose 1 until end Feb
- Triangle Pharmacy for all eligible group
- Mass vaccination site- went live 22nd Feb 10,000 capacity per week at full roll out

Priority groups- as per JCVI

- 1. Residents in a care home for older adults and their carers
- 2. All those 80 years of age and over and frontline health and social care workers
- 3. All those 75 years of age and over
- 4. All those 70 years of age and over and clinically extremely vulnerable individuals
- 5. All those 65 years of age and over
- 6. All individuals aged 16 years to 64 years with underlying health conditions which put them at higher risk of serious disease and mortality
- 7. All those 60 years of age and over
- 8. All those 55 years of age and over
- 9. All those 50 years of age and over

Examples of vaccination comms

- Local languages, local spokespeople, case studies to build confidence
- Sharing national and NHS materials, Q&As, facts e.g. mythbusting, book app if 70+, look out for scams
- Behind the scenes targeted webinars and Q&A opportunities e.g. with care homes, community leaders









Priorities for BAME Engagement Work

- Building relationships with community leaders and others within the community
- Engage to empower communities
- Engage to evaluate
- Understanding community concerns and barriers
 - -Hesitancy to engage due to historical story between the government and ethnic minority communities (back to colonialism days)
 - -Track record of services provided by the Council to be predominantly white, and lack of services delivered by people they feel they share identity with

- Promoting positive behaviors
 - -Understanding and following guidelines to help stay safe (social distancing, masks, etc.)
 - -Accessing testing
 - -Accessing the vaccine
 - -Providing regular Q&A's, dispelling myths around the vaccine
- Promoting messaging through leaders and influential representatives



- Neighboring authorities connecting with Slough, West Berks and Wokingham to share learnings from their community champion programmes.
- Voluntary sector organisations including Alliance for Cohesion and Racial Equality (ACRE) and Reading Community Learning Centre, Reading Refugee Support Group, HealthWatch Reading

Key on-going actions

- Identify influential leaders to co produce comms materials
- Propose further briefing sessions with specific groups to address the concerns specific to that community.
- Communications materials produced as per the needs of each group eg. easy read or translated, tackling specific myths or misconceptions
- Working closely with CCG/NHS to address communication and access barriers in regard to Covid-19 vaccination
- Continue to establish and build relationships with our ethnic minority communities via all communication channels such as email, social media, WhatsApp groups, phone calls.

Reading voluntary and community vaccine roll out support

Volunteers supporting the neighbourhood vaccine hubs. No one left behind - partnership of voluntary and community groups offering support to:

- Register with a GP.
- Make a vaccine appointment once eligible.
- Readibus transport to and from the hubs.
- Sharing information and updates to enable people to make an informed decision.
- Buddy support when needed language & welcome, LD, ASD, disability or communication impairment.
- Central help line with Language Line support.



Reading voluntary and community vaccine roll out support

Sample of 50 people who were eligible but not yet had the vaccine:

- 19 had a vaccine appointment booked.
- 3 receiving other treatment that prevented having the vaccine.
- 8 were supported to make and access a vaccine appointment.
- 3 were unsure and have yet to decide if they will have the vaccine.
- 19 unable to make contact.



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Local Outbreak Control Plan development- testing strategy update



Testing

- Testing rate in Reading remains good
- Monitoring up engagement with testing on-going to ensure good coverage across the Borough
- Turn around time averages 1.5 days
- Prospect Park has been converted to a 7 day a week Local Testing Site (LTS)
- Deployment plans in place for any potential "surge testing" locally
- Lateral Flow Testing increasingly being made available



What is Lateral Flow Testing?

Testing for the presence of the viral antigen

Works in a similar way to a pregnancy test, result within 30 mins with not lab processing

Primarily used for those without symptoms

Less accurate than the lab based PCR swab test

Has an important role in "case finding" and when other mitigations remain in place

Widely available in Reading;

University of Reading

Schools and Colleges

Nurseries

Health and social care settings

In outbreak situations if needed

For those unable to work from home

Logistics of Reading "key worker" testing

- Two sites in Reading (workers can attend across Berkshire)
- South Reading Leisure Centre opened Wednesday 10th Feb
- Rivermead Leisure Centre opened Monday 15 Feb
- Open to 14 essential worker groups who cannot work from home, who have contact with service users and the public, cannot be tested by their employer.

- Local media

Onsite activity

- Advice from partners about emerging demand informed the scale of the operation in Reading.
- Currently receiving bookings at 50% testing capacity.
- Further comms and engagement work being undertaken to improve take-up
- Some eligible groups now being offered home testing
- From 10th February to 19th February (7.5 working days) 773 tests have been undertaken. 2 of which were positive
