



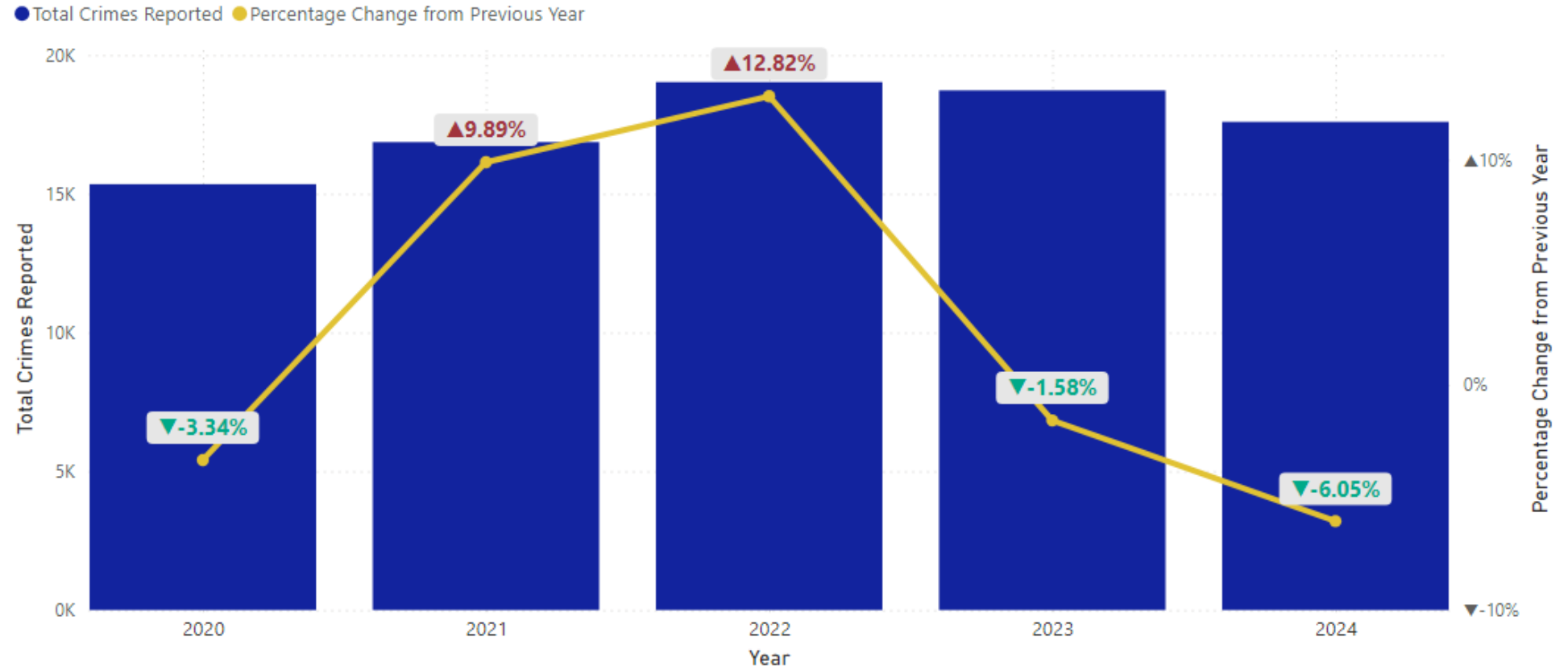

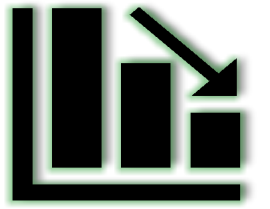


Over five years there has been a 10.82% increase in crime, however, crime started to fall steadily in 2022.

Crime in Reading started to fall in 2022

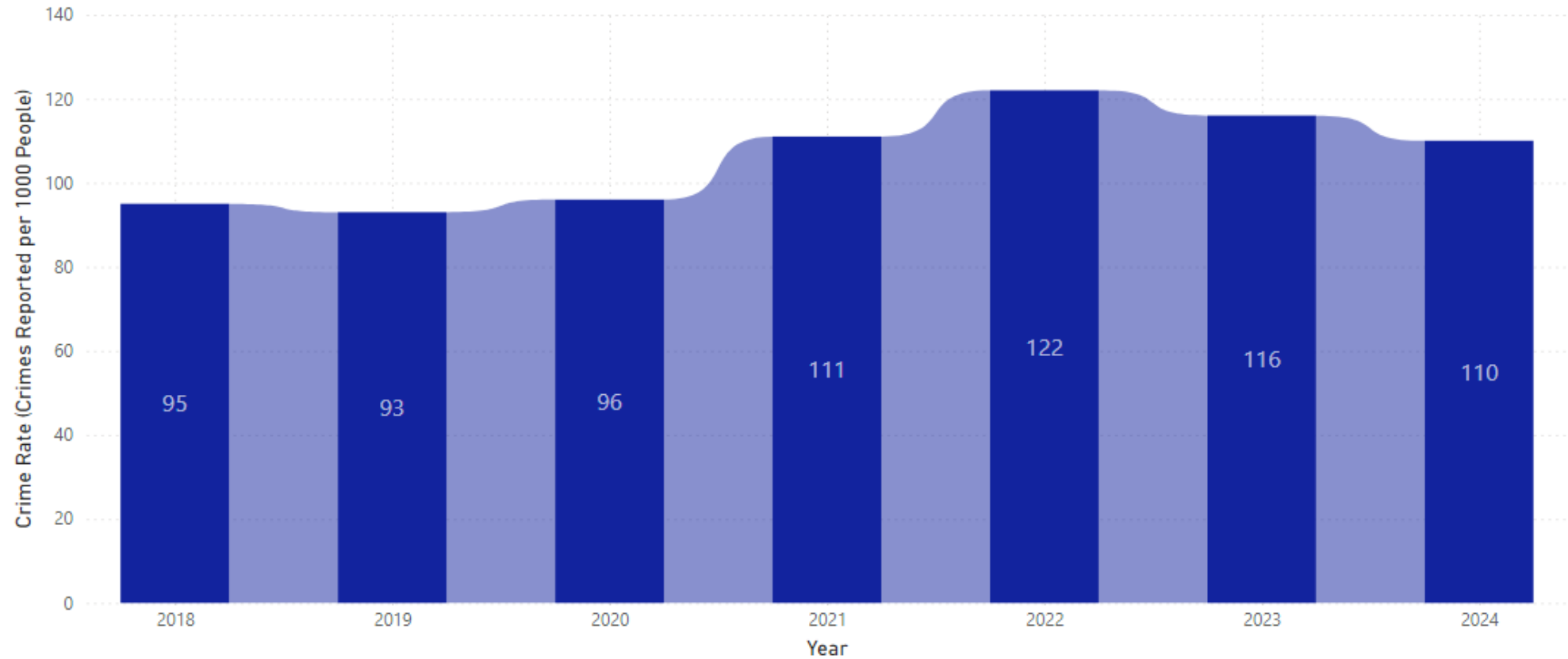


In 2023 crime started to fall with 18,724 crimes – down 1.58% from 2022

In 2024 there were 17,571 crimes in Reading - down 6.05% from 2023

Local Authority ● Reading



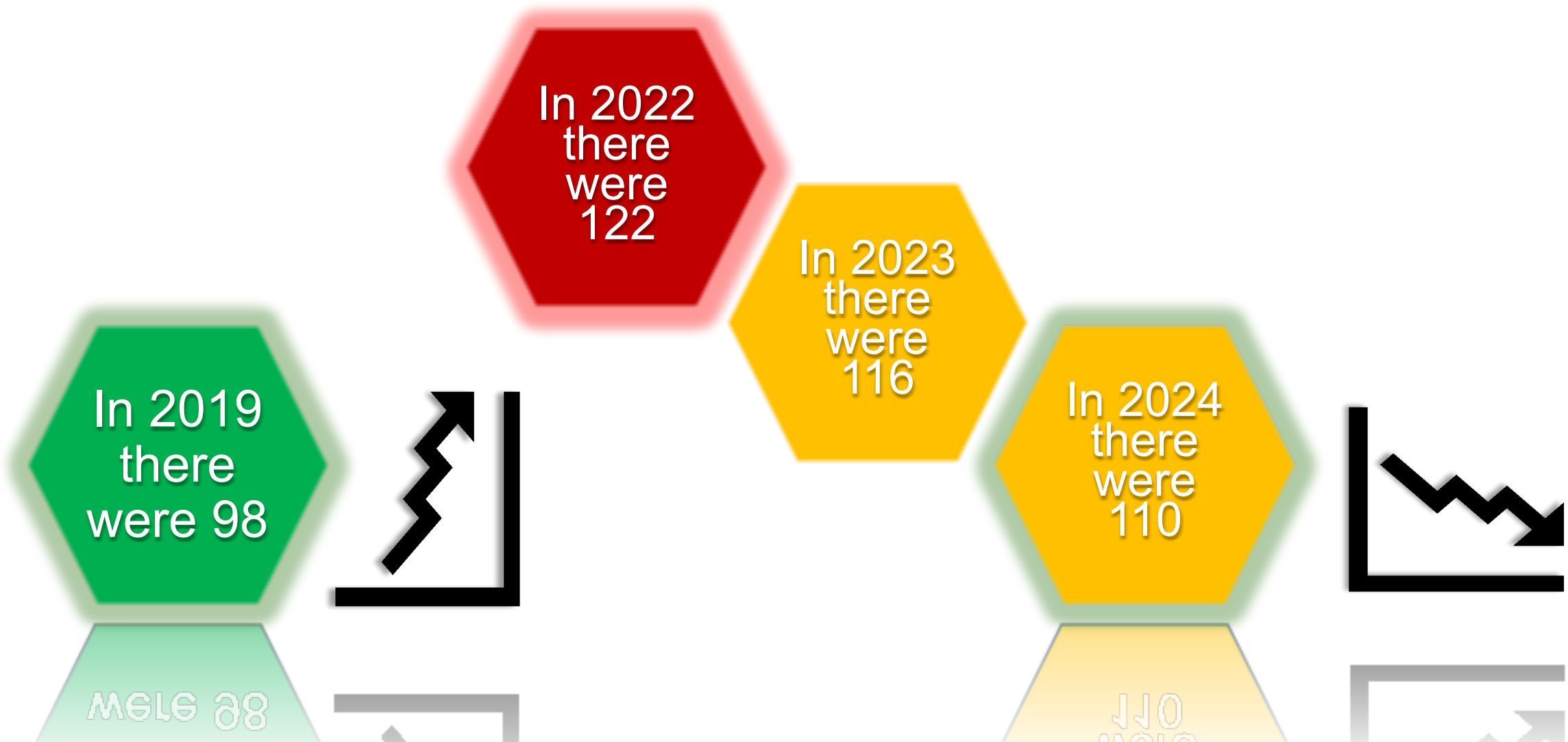
The rate of crime per 1,000 population has been falling.

In 2023 there were 122 offences per 1,000,

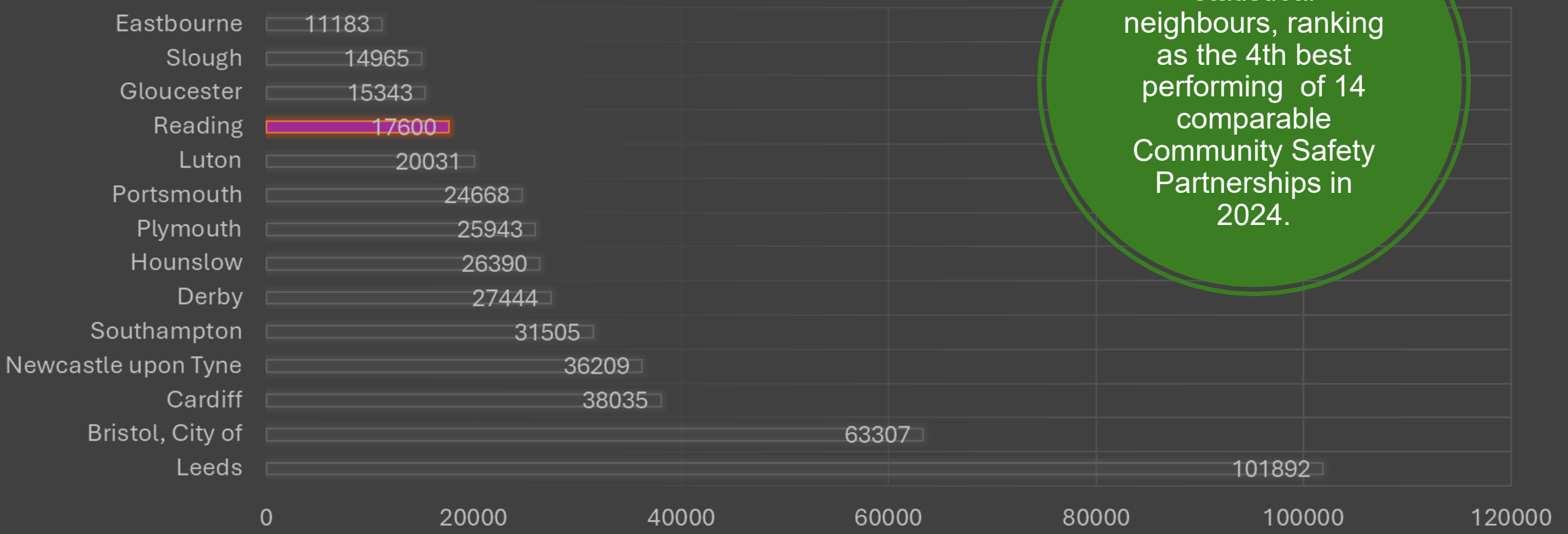
In 2024 there were 116 offences per 1,000.

In 2019, pre-covid this rate was 98.

Reading performs better than its statistical neighbours, ranking as the 4th best performing of 14 comparable Community Safety Partnerships in 2024.

How Safe Do the Public feel in 2024 compared to 2023?

50.1% said they felt safe compared with 44.8% in 2023

50% said crime had increased in their neighbourhood

57.9% said anti-social behaviour had increased where they live

The Reading Community Safety Partnership recognises there is more to do to improve public confidence, by highlighting action taken to address crime and improving the response to reports of crime and anti-social behaviour.




Residents told us....

The most frequently mentioned problems include antisocial behaviour, drug dealing and drug use.

Aggressive begging is a concern and particularly in the town centre and around Reading Station.

The use of electric bikes and scooters, often linked to drug distribution, has been highlighted as a significant problem, with many calling for stricter enforcement and regulation.

There is also a perception of a lack of police presence and response, leading to a feeling that crimes such as shoplifting and vehicle-related offences are going unchecked.

Children and Young People got involved

Children from across Reading have been involved in projects to help the Community Safety Partnership understand under 18's perceptions and experience of crime.

- This included redesigning the CSP strategy
- Contributing to the development of Stay True to You Resources with the PCC
- Led a summit about online safety, with national charities such as the Ben Kinsella Trust, Molly Rose and Breck Foundations taking part
- Working with the partnership to survey children and convene meetings with senior leaders about safety in parks and open spaces

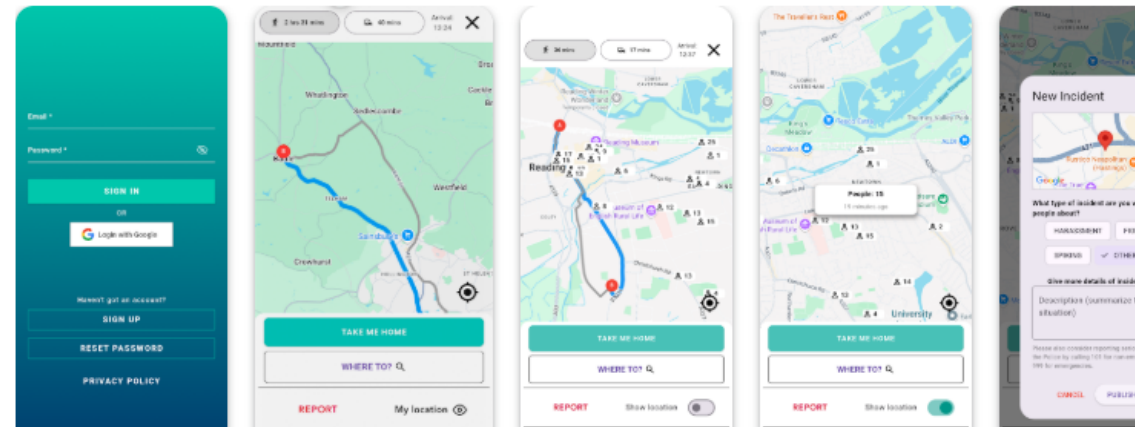

ACRE, have led a 'Hate Crime Forum' twice yearly. ACRE is now represented at the CSP.

This has been supported by activity with the CPS to audit hate crime cases and derive learning from real world experiences of hate crime.

Thames Valley Police launched a Race Action Plan, working with 'seldom heard communities'

Collaborative action in August 2024 mitigated the risk of violence at the height of community tension following the Southport attacks



Trading Standards and Licencing



Six school transport operations have been run in 2024/2025, in conjunction with other local authorities, to check on the safety of vehicles conducting school transport journeys for SEND children to offer assurance that the transit of children to and from school is safe.



RBC has undertaken vehicle safety and compliance checks which led to penalty points being issued to drivers with RBC licences.



Test purchase operations, conducted with Trading Standards, are routinely completed in pub, bars or gambling premises with gaming machines.

22 individuals who have committed offences were prosecuted = a 100% prosecution rate.



What's next in 2025?



Promote Thames Valley Police 'It does matter' and 'Consent conversations' campaigns to ensure residents are not victimised by non-consensual sexual contact and to reduce sexual assaults.

Work with Breaking Barriers on a theatre-based performance to children in schools, addressing consent and healthy relationships.

Evaluate the impact and take up of an updated 'My Way' app students use to track safe walking routes home

Ensure venue staff at licensed premises access Welfare and Vulnerability Engagement (WAVE) Training
